COCERAL




COCERAL has now gained mutual recognition with OVOCOM, QS and GMP+ International. The agreement is conditional on further minor changes being made over the coming months. These agreements ensure that combinable crops can now be traded across a wide range of assurance schemes.

COCERAL, along with AIC, hosted a training day for GTP certification bodies during November. CBs are now required to sign a contract with COCERAL. As a result the number of organisations carrying out GTP audits has reduced to 9, with a further two applied. http://bit.ly/suPeTa

TASCC's role in managing feed incidents

This year, the frequency of feed incidents at national, European and global level seems to be increasing at a pace. These incidents have included dioxins in fats and oils and arsenic in palm kernels to name just two. The consequences can be catastrophic not only for the feed ingredient supplier, but also for the whole supply chain that received any contaminated material. In a number of recent feed incidents, the companies held responsible have normally gone bankrupt as a direct result.

TASCC offers a level of protection for such events as it provides a due diligence defence as well as providing traceability which saves cost by isolating any incident quickly and effectively. With increasing pressure in this area it is vital that participants keep their TASCC Certification up-to-date to mitigate any incidents that may occur.

Section 1 - Information on variety(ies), year of harvest and store/bin number should be completed on all parcels for food sector end users, eg flour millers, maltsters, breakfast cereal manufacturers. Buyer's advice should be sought if in any doubt. Loading date is a requirement on all parcels.

Section 3 - Inspection of vehicle.

Section 5 - Mycotoxins: whilst a risk assessment for wheat deliveries to food processors is a year round requirement, testing outside the immediate post harvest period may vary across different processing sectors. To avoid doubt as to what is required please contact your purchaser to check actual requirements. Additionally, the requirement for a risk assessment result has been clarified to show a number is required.

Section 8 – Renewable Energy Directive: a new signature declaration to meet the requirements of the RED. Required in all instances where crop may enter the biofuel supply chain and in conjunction with auditing to the required sustainability criteria under crop assurance.



TASCC participants can now use Point of Delivery (POD) forms which are to be found on the TASCC web site http://bit.ly/tTFAzG. The forms are designed to identify health and safety hazards at farm delivery sites (eg faulty steps or power lines).

The forms detail address and contact details for the delivery site plus written and pictorial descriptions of the hazard. These are given to the driver before setting off to the delivery site. The form will be available as a Word document on the web making modification by the TASCC participant simple and straightforward.



Transport wash stations

With winter nearly upon us, cleaning trailers is an important part of the code. Therefore, AIC is compiling a list of wash stations across the country. This will be added to the AIC web site.



Sanitising trailers

The basic aim of TASCC is food and feed safety, so it is important that trailers that carry food/feed stuffs are correctly cleaned. Recent analysis of the Top 5 haulage nonconformances show that cleaning and

sanitising the interior and exterior of trailers remains the most common problem. AIC is producing a fact sheet to help hauliers carry out these task and so reduce non-conformances.
