### FAR Sustainability CPD feedback

Thank you to all those who have provided feedback for the first two modules of the FAR Sustainability CPD.

94% of advisers who have taken the Introduction to Sustainability module gave the course a full 5/5 rating and the vast majority of participants found it interesting and informative on the role of agriculture in sustainability.

### **GFLI UK Feed Ingredient Data**

AIC held a well-attended workshop for the feed sector earlier this year on the use of a GFLI (Global Feed LCA Institute) data subset that AIC has produced to enable Members to calculate GHG emissions for the feeds they manufacture. This data is becoming a valuable tool for feed advisers when considering how to reduce a farm's footprint of their feed and, therefore, their livestock enterprises.

Jane Salter gave workshop participants a background to the environmental policy landscape and AIC Sustainability Roadmap and how using GFLI data can deliver progress on these commitments. Nick Major, in his capacity as Board member of GFLI, explained how the data had been developed and that technical credibility of the data has resulted in global feed industry support for the development of GFLI.

Andrew Pearson of AIC then demonstrated to participants how to use the UK data subset that AIC have made available to Members, while Michael Marsden of AB Agri provided some practical examples of how modifying ration formulation can impact GHG emissions.

The UK data subset and guidance is now available on the AIC website for Members.

### Sustainability Self-Assessment Framework

The AIC and AIC Services Sustainability Liason Group is developing a Sustainability Self-Assessment Framework to assist Members in identifying, setting and working towards sustainability goals, and tracking their sustainability performance.

The framework is based on the commitments in the AIC Roadmap for a Sustainable Food Chain, taking into account priority sustainability issues identified by the group, expectation of sustainability policy coming down the line, and knowledge and expertise of sustainable practice and compliance schemes.

The Self-Assessment Framework is designed to be a strategic tool to help Members think about technical detail on individual topics.

Criteria by which a business can be assessed are in the process of being challenged and reviewed at Sector Committees, with a launch target of autumn later this year.



### **Animal Health & Welfare Pathway Review**

AIC's Feed Sector has entered discussions with Defra on the importance of nutrition when conducting health and welfare reviews. Defra has accepted that a successful outcome of the reviews will depend upon input from all farm advisers and is considering how vet-led teams will engage with nutritionists and other advisers to put together plans that deliver better health and welfare.

The first part of the Animal Health and Welfare Pathway has been launched as part of SFI 2022 with an Annual Health and Welfare Review. This will pay for a yearly visit by a vet for livestock keepers who are currently eligible for BPS. The aim is to identify where health and welfare could be improved and this, in turn, could unlock future funding or investment for improvements in animal husbandry.
